

Recovery and Restoration

In October, Hurricane Michael devastated many in our community and especially our neighbors to the east in Bay, Washington, Jackson, Holmes and Gulf counties. Although our small part of the world in South Walton did not suffer the depth of destruction our neighboring counties experienced, we have all been affected by it.

The leadership of the Seaside Institute contracted with FEMA expert Laura Clemons of Collaborative Communities Management Company, LLC. We had the opportunity to tour some of the more devastated areas. Seeing the destruction first hand has left an indelible impression on each of us along with the realization that we must do more than raise money.

What we at the Seaside Institute learned is just how much is not known, on how to recover after a disaster. The "rules" of recovery are not simple and unfortunately, our need to return to a sense of normalcy is counter to how recovery systems work in reality. Our determination to get back to normal is much more than repairing the damage to buildings and roads. It's navigating the nuances of insurance, finances and government support. Finding housing, food and clothing, filling out forms and getting medications can be challenging on a good day, more so while you are in shock after losing

donated for your generosity. All the money raised (less credit card fees) is going directly to local families to provide help in rebuilding homes that have been damaged so that families have a safe place to live.

The 2019 winners of the Seaside Prize are known for their designs of homes and communities shaping the way we live.

We would like to congratulate and introduce you to our 2019 winners:

Thomas Christ, principal architect of Christ & Associates of Santa Rosa Beach. Christ has had a significant impact on our area designing more than 90 home and structures in Seaside and has won many design awards along the way. In addition, Tom Christ has contributed his work to the communities of Alys Beach, Rosemary Beach, WaterColor and WaterSound.

Richard Gibbs is an experienced architect, urbanist and preservationist. Leaving a significant imprint on our area both as a designer and the town architect of Seaside. His work includes restoration of old homes and new designs that easily integrate into historic sites and can be seen in Seaside, Rosemary Beach, Draper Lake and Brewster Point in Rockport, Maine.

John Massengale has won awards for architecture, urbanism, architectural history, and historic preservation. He is a founding member of the Congress for New Urbanism and has designed the Savannah Sands house in Seaside. His commitment to his craft is exemplified in his work as an architect, author, and professor for Notre Dame and the University of Miami.

Derrick Smith is the principal architect at A+S Architects and Planners in Miami Florida. Earning a Master's Degree from Harvard University and a Bachelor of Architecture from University of Miami, Smith is a leader in architectural and sustainable design, as well as comprehensive planning. His work includes designing 10 homes in Seaside such as Fourth of July, Marisol

and Summertime, as well as being the town architect in 1985.

Charles "Chip" Warren is an award-winning architect based in New York. His work includes award-winning designs across the United States, including Natchez Park in Seaside. He also served as Seaside's town architect and taught at Michigan's College of Architecture and Urban Planning. Chip has authored a number of books on Architecture and its history.

Each of these award-winning architects has left their indelible mark on the world through their designs, thought leadership, and contributions to educating students in the art and craft of architecture.
